WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO ATTEND?

All Colorado high school students who will be 9th through 12th graders in 2010-11.

DELEGATE LIMIT:

10 students per school.

IS THERE ANYWAY TO SEND ADDITIONAL STUDENTS?

No Students will be accepted after the camp maximum of 500, on a first-come basis. 10 Students from each school prior to the maximum will be accepted.

MUST AN ADULT SPONSOR ACCOMPANY THE STUDENT?

No, but the advisor program will help motivate and inspire the adult sponsor for the upcoming school year. Total supervision is provided by the experienced adult staff and junior counselors. Students will not be allowed to leave the camp or to attend camp for specific dates only. Please do not register delegates that can't commit for the entire camp. **(NO EXCEPTIONS)**

A special adult sponsors' group class is available for college credit. The sponsors' group is conducted in conjunction with the camp and a leadership curriculum is provided.

WHAT IS THE COST OF STUDENT COUNCIL LEADERSHIP CAMP?

Registration fee is **\$220.00** per delegate and must be submitted in the form of a school check. Fee includes room and board, all instructional materials, and camp T-shirt.

TRANSPORTATION:

Each school/delegate is responsible for providing their transportation.

HOW TO REGISTER

1. Each delegate must complete the online delegate registration form found on our website www.chsaa.org sports and activities/student council/2010 registration form. Fill out the online form and print it and then have it signed by the Principal, your parent, delegate and Advisor. (NO EXCEPTIONS ON SIGNATURES) and then mail it to the CHSAA (14855 E. Second Avenue, Aurora, CO 80011). Be sure to keep a copy of all your registration papers.
2. Each sponsor wishing to attend must complete the enclosed sponsor registration form and then mail to the CHSAA.
3. The school should submit (no later than June 1, 2010) to the Colorado High School Activities Association:
 - all registration forms with signatures
 - all parent permit forms with signatures
 - one check for all delegates, alternates and sponsors made payable to CHSAA (number attending x registration fee.)

PLEASE NOTE: ANY ALTERNATES WILL ONLY BE ACCEPTED IF THEY ARE OF THE SAME GENDER AND FROM THE SAME SCHOOL AS THE PERSON THEY WILL BE REPLACING.

You will be an important part of a most unique experience – the purpose . . . so that you will be more qualified, knowledgeable, and confident than ever before, to return home and more adequately meet the demands of RESPONSIBLE STUDENT LEADERSHIP.

Staff is composed of enthusiastic, inspired, and quality leaders from throughout Colorado who are “up-to-date” and who know what’s happening . . . the Junior Counselors are “dynamic” and primarily interested in YOU!!

YOU NEED

- ◆ A supply of pens/pencils to write with. 
- ◆ Towels, soap, toilet articles . . . don't worry about the bedding . . . it's furnished . . . all you do is take care of it!
- ◆ Sorry, we are on “no maid” service . . . this will save you the tips. 
- ◆ Not much more than \$30.00 for spending money . . . snack, etc. 
- ◆ BANQUET/CANDLE LIGHTING – One dress-up event – coat, tie, high class but not Prom . . . gals – your party dress will do fine . . . Bermudas and walking shorts during the day (but please not short shorts!) . . . afternoon clothes – not dressy, but not sloppy either.
- ◆ Spirit Day Outfits!!!! Each day will have a different dress-up theme. See the enclosed flyer for a description of each day.

- ◆ If you are driving, your keys will be checked and given to your adult advisor.

FINALLY . . . there is the faith that you will return home with a renewed desire, dedication, and “bubbling” enthusiasm to help others and to get something accomplished.

AREMINDER:

The Camp operates under very few – but strict – rules regarding tobacco, alcohol and drugs. We also set definite boundaries on the campus, and required “lights out” rules. Any delegate violating the rules will have a call placed to their home and/or school administrator. Violations to rules may result in a delegate being sent home.

...TO MORE ADEQUATELY MEET THE DEMANDS OF RESPONSIBLE STUDENT LEADERSHIP BY.....

- Giving student leaders an opportunity to discuss and explore, in greater depth, those problems and issues “happening now” in their schools.
- Coming to better understand the role and new dimensions of Student Council responsibility.
- Helping student leaders come to understand the importance of cooperation and the ability to work harmoniously with others.
- Stimulating and encouraging the self-development of student leaders.
- Helping student leaders encourage others to express themselves and become more involved in the leadership and responsibility of the school.
- Helping student leaders develop an understanding and awareness of effective media of communication and publicity.
- Helping student leaders develop a healthy self-image and respect for the views and identify of others.
- Developing awareness on the part of students of the privileges and responsibilities of a democratic society.
- Developing techniques and skills pertinent to the understanding of leadership responsibility.
- Helping student leaders develop an awareness of the mutuality of similar problems.
- Giving student leaders direction and guidance in the proper planning, organization and coordination of Student Council activities and programs.
- Developing a confidence on the part of both administration and the student body that Student Council is a democratic and representative student organization.
- Developing student loyalty and “esprit de corps” on the campus.
- Becoming more sensitive and appreciative of the feelings and problems of others.
- Instilling the ideals and principles of leadership and understanding its implication upon future life goals.
